# LEARN AT WHTC

## 1. LECTURES

Lectures are where you will listen to subject experts sharing their knowledge and discoveries in challenging and thought provoking ways. In Academics you will be introduced to key facts and ideas in a way that will help you build a sound and up-to-date knowledge base in your subject, and gain appreciation of how and why we have reached our current stage of understanding in the field. You can expect to do more than just listen during a 2-hours lecture. You will be asked to consider different viewpoints, make on-the-spot judgments and decisions, and solve problems.



## 2. SELF-STUDY

Self-study is an important element of your education. At WHTC, you supplement your understanding through research into different perspectives on the topic; deepening your knowledge of an area at your own pace. Lectures map out the terrain of the topic and stimulate your curiosity. Then you find out more through your own independent study and teamwork with fellow students, both before and after lecture hours.



## 3. PEER-GROUP LEARNING

Peer-group learning is where you may be asked by your lecturers to direct a lesson or prepare a presentation on a specified subject with your fellow classmates. By interacting with the lesson material, you will become experts in the area and remember the content more effectively.

## 4. LABORATORY-BASED

As a Pharmacy student, laboratory-based work is your chance to recreate some of the groundbreaking experiments that pushed forward the boundaries of knowledge within your field, get practical experience and apply knowledge you have learnt in your lectures in a laboratory setting. Through laboratory sessions, you will learn to expertly analyze real-life problems, which will equip you with the practical and analytical skills valued by employers.



## 6. OSCE AND OSPE

The Objective Structures Clinical Examination (OSCE) is used as a means to provide standardized and objective evaluation of clinical skills required for nurses' future professional activity. OSCE evaluates areas most critical to performance of health care professionals such as communication skills and ability to handle unpredictable patient behavior. This will help you to master different clinical skills and prepare you for an adequate response to specific problems through simulation of various practical scenarios. You will practice clinical skills in a safe and controlled environment under the supervision of your lecturers.

Objective Structured Practical Examination (OSPE) is used to assess skills that are not the usual focus of our teaching and learning activities in Environmental Health Science. OSPE involves you in improving what we do. The practical competencies may include you giving a 30 min health talk on a given topic to an audience, screening travelers and completing documentation at a point of entry, carrying out risk assessments at a place of work etc.



## 7. YOUR OWN RESEARCH PROJECT

As a Bachelor's degree student, your own research project gives you the opportunity to produce an extended, in-depth piece of work, a final-year dissertation research project designed by yourself according to your own research interests. The research project will be overseen by an Academic staff-member who is an expert in this area.

Welwitchia University trading as Welwitchia Health Training Centre has since opened other two campuses offering Bachelor of Nursing Science i.e. Katima Mulilo, Kombat, Nkurenkuru and Walvis Bay in addition to the Windhoek campus.

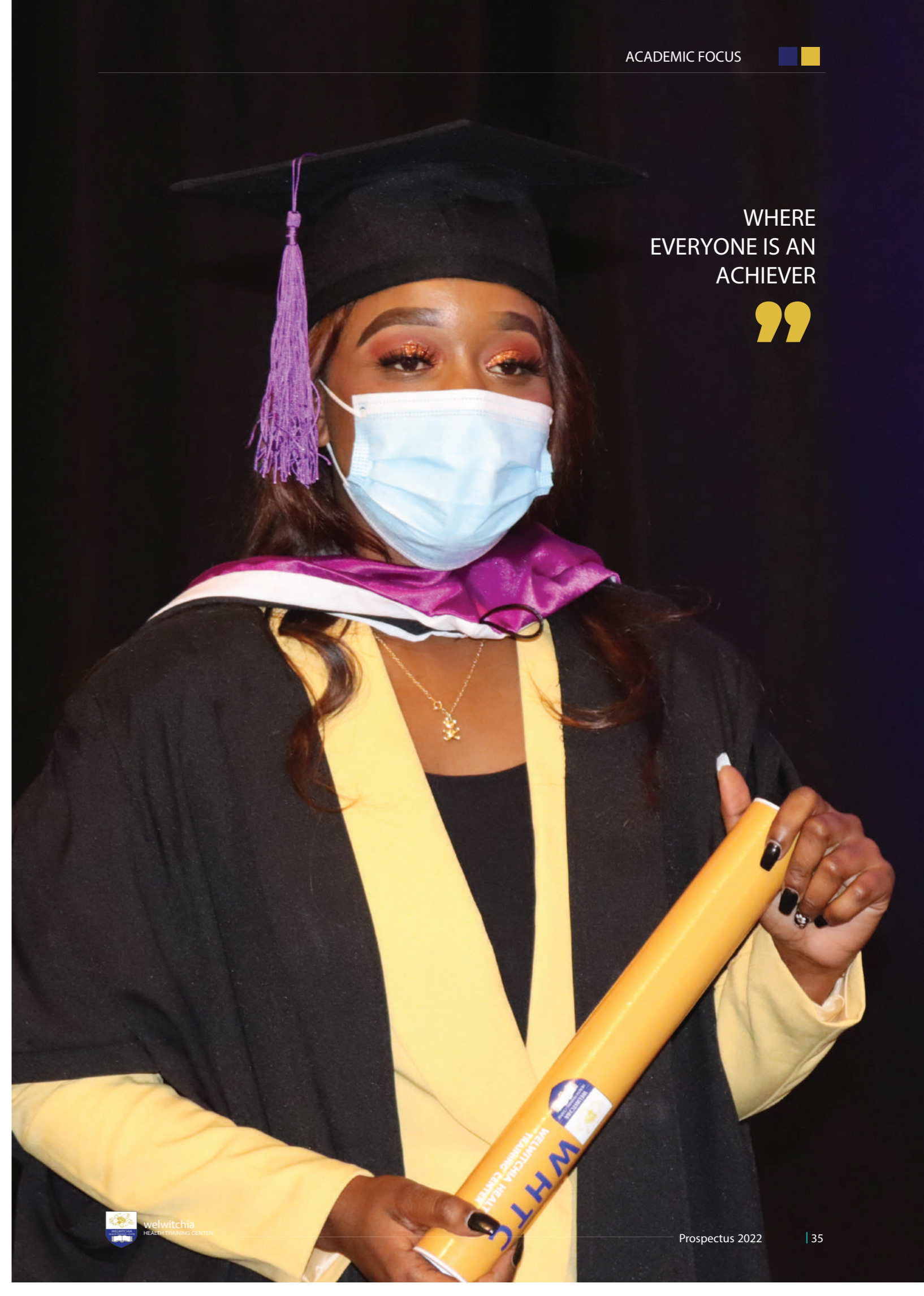

# ADMISSIONS

## ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

### POSTGRADUATE DIPLOMA IN COMMUNITY HEALTH NURSING:

A candidate who wishes to enroll for the Postgraduate Diploma in Community Health Nursing should comply with the following admission criteria.

- Good academic record from any recognized Institution of Higher Learning
- Must be a registered nurse/midwife/Accoucheur, registered with The Nursing Council of Namibia HPCNA
- Minimum of two years working experience as a nurse/midwife in any health facilities after basic nurse training.
- Write a one-page motivational letter giving reasons for taking the course.

### BACHELOR OF NURSING SCIENCE:

A candidate who wishes to enroll for the degree program within the Clara Barton School of Nursing, must comply with the following admission criteria:

- Hold a valid National Senior Secondary Certificate (NSSC) at ordinary level or at higher level.
- Must have obtained at least 25 points in Six (6) subjects and a D or better symbol in English according to the APS scale.
- For Grade 11 (New Curriculum), the candidate must have at least 30 points with a C or better symbol in English according to the APS scale.
- Should have at least three science subjects (Mathematics, Physical Science, Chemistry, Biology and Development Studies).
- Enrolled nurses with more than a year of working experience may apply with minimum 22 points and an E symbol in English at Grade 12 level.
- An applicant who is 25 years or older with basic nursing experience for 5 years, can be admitted through mature-age examination to the nursing programme
- Admitted students will be registered with the Nursing Council of Namibia as Student Nurses for the duration of their studies.

### BACHELOR OF NURSING SCIENCE ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS INCLUDE:

1. Certified copy of valid passport
2. Affidavit of financial support (Financial statements accompanied by relevant supporting documents)
3. All foreign qualifications must be validated by the Namibia Qualifications Authority (NQA).
4. Should pass the Aptitude test to gain final admission.

### CERTIFICATE IN ENROLLED NURSE AND MIDWIFE/ACCOUCHEUR:

A candidate who wishes to enroll for the certificate program within the Clara Barton School of Nursing, must comply with the following admission criteria:

1. Must have obtained at least 22 points in Six (6) subjects and an E in English according to the APS scale in grade 12 OR 27 points in Six (6) subjects and a D in English according to the APS scale in grade 11 (New Curriculum).
2. Should have two of the following science subjects, Mathematics, Physical Science, Chemistry, Biology and Development Studies.
3. Should pass the Aptitude test to gain final admission.

### DIPLOMA IN ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH SCIENCE:

A candidate who wishes to enroll for the Diploma in Environmental Health Science, must comply with the following admission criteria:

1. Minimum of 23 Points in Six (6) in Grade 12 with E symbol in English OR 27 points in Six (6) subjects in grade 11 (New Curriculum) with a D in English.
2. Should have two of the following subjects: Mathematics, Physical Science and Chemistry.
3. Should pass the entry test to gain final admission

### CERTIFICATE IN PHARMACY ASSISTANT:

A candidate who wishes to enroll for the Pharmacist's Assistant Certificate should comply with the following admission criteria:

- Minimum of 22 Points in Six (6) Subjects in Grade 12 with E symbol in English;  
OR 27 points in Six (6) subjects in grade 11(New Curriculum) with a D symbol in English.
- Should have two of the following subjects: Mathematics, Physical Science and Chemistry
- Must pass the entry test to gain final admission.

### CERTIFICATE IN HEALTH SCIENCE FOUNDATION:

A candidate who wishes to enroll in the Health Science Foundation should comply with the following admission criteria:

- Minimum of 10 points in Grade 12 or Grade 11 new curriculum.

### 3. TUITION FEES

#### THE FOLLOWING SHALL APPLY:

- 3.1 Namibian Students are required to pay 25% deposit of the total annual tuition upon registration.
- 3.2 All international students shall pay a 50% deposit of the total annual tuition fees upon registration
- 3.3 Each student is required to pay an instalment of 10% of the remaining balance after 25% deposit (Namibian Students).
- 3.4 Each student is required to pay an instalment of 10% of the remaining balance after 50% deposit (Foreign Students).
- 3.5 Students also have an option of full payment (year) on tuition at registration or semester payment (twice a year).
- 3.6 Tuition fees paid by installment shall be paid on or before the 7th of each month for 10 months irrespective of the date of enrolment/commencement of classes.
- 3.7 Students in arrears of up to two (2) months installments will be suspended from classes until such fees owed have been paid in full.
- 3.8 Tuition fees shall be paid fully per course and not per duration of the course irrespective of the date of the start of classes.
- 3.9 A penalty of 9.7% will be charged on late payments.
- 3.10 Students will not be allowed to sit for any exam with outstanding amounts on their account.
- 3.11 No transcripts/examination results shall be released to any student before clearing all outstanding fees.

### 4. BURSARY STUDENTS

- 4.1 No confirmation letters by Sponsors during the examination period will be accepted for examination admission
- 4.2 Written proof/contract of bursaries/loan/grant awarded must be provided by sponsored students at registration.
- 4.3 NSFAP students to pay full registration fees and deposits upon registration and required to continue with payments until such a time the student receives a final award letter

### 5. GRADUATION FEES

### 6. WHTC STUDENT HEALTH FUND
